AGENDA ITEM #1 PUBLIC COMMENTS

There were no public comments.

AGENDA ITEM #2 COUNCIL ADMINISTRATION

A. December 12, 2018 Council Meeting Minutes

Chair Thompson asked if there were any changes to the December 12, 2018 Council Meeting Minutes.

MOTION

There being none, Keith Keene moved to approve the Council Meeting Minutes as submitted. Jackie Tucker seconded.

Motion carried unanimously.

B. January 2019 Financial Report

Pat Steed reviewed the Statement of Activities and Statement of Net Assets for the month ended January 2019.

MOTION

Bryant Culpepper moved to accept the January 12, 2018 Financial Report as presented. John Shoop seconded.

Motion carried unanimously.

AGENDA ITEM #3 DESOTO COUNTY ACTIVITIES REPORT

DeSoto County Administrator Mandy Hines reported that DeSoto County has successfully joined the P25 Communications Network with Polk, Highlands and Hardee Counties. With the addition of DeSoto County this is the largest interconnected P25 system in the nation. She reported that DeSoto County has completed construction of a new \$1.7 million fire station. DeSoto County is also constructing a new \$4.2 million section of the County landfill. Ms. Hines discussed the work being done to stop the erosion at Morgan Park along the Peach River. After the hurricane caused further damage, USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service helped DeSoto County fund a remediation project, driving pilings into the ground and constructing fencing along the area. She reported that as of February 12, 2019 the DeSoto County Board of County Commission approved the



construction of a \$18 million Nuco Citrus facility on Highway 72, across from the Peace River Citrus Plant in DeSoto County. Nuco Citrus will be an around-the-clock manufacturing plant that produces pectin from the wet-peel obtained from the nearby citrus plant. Nuco Citrus will provide 120 high-paying jobs to the community and is working with DeSoto County Economic Development Agency and South Florida State College to provide a certified training program as early as August. Ms. Hines introduced the newly elected DeSoto County Commissioner JC Deriso, who was in attendance.

AGENDA ITEM #4 GOVERNMENT IN THE SUNSHINE PRESENTATION BY NORMAN WHITE, COUNCIL ATTORNEY

Norman White, Council Attorney, provided information on Florida's Government in the Sunshine laws, rules and regulations which govern Council Members and their communications. Discussion followed.

AGENDA ITEM #5 RESOLUTION APPROVING PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION GRANT AGREEMENT (PTGA) WITH FDOT FOR 5310 FUNDS

Marcia Staszko, CFRPC staff, stated that FDOT has proposed a new PTGA for Federal 5310 funds awarded to the CFRPC for transportation for the elderly and individuals with disabilities through the coordinated system in Hardee, Highlands, and Okeechobee Counties.

MOTION

Buddy Mansfield moved to adopt Resolution 2019-2A as presented. Don Elwell seconded.

Motion carried unanimously.

AGENDA ITEM #6 RESOLUTION APPROVING PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION GRANT AGREEMENT (PTGA) WITH FDOT FOR 5311 FUNDS

Marcia Staszko, CFRPC staff, stated that FDOT has proposed a new PTGA for Federal 5311 funds awarded to the CFRPC for public transportation through the coordinated system in Hardee, Highlands, and Okeechobee Counties.

AGENDA ITEM #7 UPDATE ON THE HEARTLAND REGIONAL TRANSPORTATION PLANNING ORGANIZATION (HRTPO)

Pat Steed updated the Council on current activities of the HRTPO. She reviewed the HRTPO Board and subcommittee meeting schedules, including the TD Local Coordinating Boards (LCB), which are now under the HRTPO. Staff is beginning work to update the 2045 Long Range Transportation Plan for the six counties of the HRTPO, which is required every five years. The LRTP will forecast future growth of the six-county region and the need for possible new corridors for added capacity to the road system for 2045. The Heartland 2060 effort was used in the development of the first LRTP. The Council has received grant funding from DEO to update the population and economic forecast for the Heartland 2060 effort, which will be used to update the LRTP. Ms. Steed mentioned several corridors in the region that the HRTPO continues to work toward furthering their safety, including SR 70.

AGENDA ITEM #8 FLORIDA 2030

John Kaliski, Cambridge Systematics, presented information, findings and recommendations of the Florida 2030 project, which was led by the Florida Chamber Foundation to develop a blue-print for Florida's future economy. The Six Pillars of Florida was used as a framework for the 2030 project. Mr. Kaliski presented information on the types of data collected to project future growth patterns, and discussed several drivers of the changes that are expected in the State. He discussed the types of jobs forecasted for the future, along with growth patterns, population diversity, and urbanization. Mr. Kaliski also presented several goals Florida has set in order to be in a highly competitive position to secure its future.

AGENDA ITEM #9 RESOLUTION HONORING BRIAN TEEPLE

Pat Steed stated that Brian Teeple is retiring from his distinguished career after serving the Northeast Florida Regional Council for 37 years, and the last 24 years as its CEO/Executive Director. She presented a Resolution honoring his service.

AGENDA ITEM #10 RESOLUTION FOR NORTH CENTRAL FLORIDA REGIONAL PLANNING COUNCIL (NCFRPC)

Pat Steed stated that the NCFRPC will celebrate their 50th Anniversary this year. She presented a Resolution recognizing that milestone.

AGENDA ITEM #11 REPORT ON THE FLORIDA REGIONAL COUNCILS ASSOCIATION (FRCA) JANUARY POLICY BOARD MEETING

Pat Steed stated that the FRCA Policy Board meets twice each year. The last meeting was held in January 2019 in Tallahassee. The Policy Board Members attending were Jackie Tucker and Nathaniel Birdsong. At the Policy Board Meeting staff highlighted the Avon Park Air Force Range Sentinel Landscape project, which is a collaboration between the Range, the contiguous local governments, the agricultural community and the conservationist on a project designated as one of few in the country to promote natural resource sustainability and preservation of agricultural and conservation land uses in areas surrounding military installations.

Jackie Tucker stated that her main concern is the housing issue in Florida. She described a project in DeSoto County that has successfully addressed the shortage of decent affordable housing. She also commended Pat Steed for her leadership as Executive Director.

Ms. Steed presented highlights of the FRCA Annual Report including its mission, focus areas and national awards received. She reviewed the Policy Board's priority strategies and issues, and presented information regarding ongoing cooperative work among the Regional Planning Councils in the State.

AGENDA ITEM #12 EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Pat Steed, Executive Director, reported on current legislative activities, including preemption bills over local authority, and the Regional Councils Association Bill to fund an update to the Statewide Regional Evacuation Plans. Discussion followed.

Ms. Steed presented information on the continuing work with the Economic Development Administration (EDA) on an Aviation Study. Staff is working on a local project for a grant to be submitted for regular competitive EDA funding.

Ms. Steed presented the FRCA Monthly Progress Report which provided information on current activities.

AGENDA ITEM #13 ELECTION OF COUNCIL OFFICERS FOR 2019

A committee to nominate a Chair and Vice-Chair of the Council for 2019 was appointed at the last Council meeting. The Committee met at 9:00 a.m., just prior to this meeting. Members in attendance were: Okeechobee County Commissioner Bryant Culpepper,



DeSoto County Gubernatorial Appointee Jackie Tucker, and City of Sebring Mayor John Shoop. The Committee Chair, Bryant Culpepper stated that the committee voted to nominate Hardee County Commissioner Mike Thompson to continue serving as Chairman for 2019, and voted to nominate City of Wauchula Commissioner Neda Cobb to continue serving as Vice Chairman for 2019.

MOTION

Bill Read moved to close nominations and elect Mike Thompson as Chairman of the Council for 2019 and to elect Neda Cobb as Vice Chairman of the Council for 2019. Jackie Tucker seconded.

Motion carried unanimously.

RESOLUTION 2019-4A

A RESOLUTION OF THE CENTRAL FLORIDA REGIONAL PLANNING COUNCIL SUPPORTING A STATEWIDE REVOLVING LAND FUND PROGRAM FUNDED BY THE US ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT ADMINISTRATION (EDA) AND ADMINISTERED BY THE FLORIDA DEPARTMENT OF ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITY (DEO) TO ASSIT ELIGIBLE BUSINESSES AFFECTED BY HURRICANE IRMA AND FUTURE DISASTERS.

WHEREAS, The Central Florida Regional Planning Council serves as the Economic Development District (EDD) for the Central Florida region of Desoto, Hardee, Highlands, Okeechobee, and Polk Counties; and

WHEREAS, the EDD maintains the Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS) for the District; and

WHEREAS, the revolving loan fund is consistent with the CEDS; and

WHEREAS, the EDD works closely with the region's economic development organizations as well as the State of Florida and its agencies; and

WHEREAS, impacts from Hurricane Irma made evident the need for additional capital to assist small businesses in recovering from large-scale disasters; and

WHEREAS, the Statewide Revolving Loan Fund would ensure continuity of the EDD's and EDA's efforts to support small businesses in Florida; and

WHEREAS, historically EDA has funded revolving loan fund programs through the EDDs in Florida, including programs currently housed at the Apalachee and South Florida EDDs for disbursement of revolving loan funds in those regions;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CENTRAL FLORIDA REGIONAL PLANNING COUNCIL:

- Supports a Statewide (Florida) revolving loan fund program to be administered by the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity and funded by the US Economic Development Administration to provide capital for loans for eligible businesses affected by Hurricane Irma and future disasters.
- Supports ensuring continuity of the EDDs' and EDA's efforts to support small businesses in Florida, through EDA and DEO using the existing programs at the Apalachee and South Florida EDDs for servicing the loans in these regions.

WHEREAS, the continued update of the Heartland 2060 Initiative will support a variety of programs, grants, and other initiatives throughout the seven counties of the Heartland; and

Encroachment to Military Installations

ncreasing Encroachment Challenges:

There are a growing number of encroachment challenges to military installations in Florida. In some cases, local officials are unaware of the extent of these challenges and how they can negatively impact the ability of the military installation to accomplish training and operational missions that prepare military units for combat. These encroachment challenges include, but are not limited to:

- Sea and Air Space and Land Restrictions
- Airborne Noise
- **Urban Growth**
- **Frequency Spectrum Encroachment** Competition for finite electromagnetic environment (EME) spectrum resources. This includes the radio frequency spectrum.
- 5. Endangered Species/Critical Habitat Presence of threatened and endangered species and critical habitats on or within training areas and ranges
 - **6. Energy Compatibility and Availability** Onshore and offshore energy development of oil, gas, and renewable as well as associated pipelines and electrical transmission lines
- Air Quality
- 8. Water
- 9. Cultural Resources
- 10. Unexploded ordinance and Munitions Infringement on explosive safety arcs and footprints (e.g., surface danger zones, weapon danger zones, and electromagnetic and radio frequency radiation).

- 14. Natural Factors, Weather and Climate

- 16. Foreign interests, mergers and acquisitions, and development in and around military assets and resources.



How Encroachment Impacts the Millitary Mission: Encroachment may lead to a diminished capability and capacity for US Armed Forces to train for combat.

Reduces usage days

Prohibits certain operational, training and testing events

- Segments training and reduces realism
- Reduces range access
- Restricts flight altitudes

Limits new technologies

- Inhibits new tactics development
- Reduces live fire proficiency
- Complicates night and all weather operations and training

Website & Document Compliance

with the

Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) Requirements

People with disabilities may face barriers to accessing information online. People who are visually impaired may use devices that speak text that would normally appear on a computer screen. People who are unable to operate a computer mouse may use voice recognition software to control their computers with verbal commands. Websites and documents must be developed to be accessible by people with many types of disabilities. Below is a guide to develop ADA Compliant websites and documents.

Website Compliance

The overall structure of the website needs to be compliant and structured properly for screen readers. This means that the HTML structure of the website must:

- Follow the World Wide Web Consortium (W3C) standards for websites https://www.w3.org/standards/.
- Follow the correct order of heading tags (H1 to H6, no skipping levels).
- Include alternate text for all images that are not decorative.
- All icons need an alternate version of text to identify the purpose of the icon.
- All videos need to contain subtitles and transcripts.
- Flashing graphics are discouraged as they can trigger those sensitive to strobes.

This requires users to properly upload and fill out the necessary fields to prevent the images or text from rendering incorrectly.

Document Compliance

Documents must contain accessibility features that will enable screen readers to process text on a document to be read aloud to its users. This means that a document must have at a minimum the items listed below.

- Provide digital selectable text (cannot be a scanned image-only document).
- Contain a title, subject, author, and keywords in the meta-data.
- Be a tagged pdf, containing heading, paragraph, list, table, and other tags.
- Primary language must be set.
- Bookmarks for large documents must be set.
- Must logically read out in the correct order.
- Color contrast cannot be low. High color contrast is preferred.
- All images that are not decorative, must contain alternate text to describe the images.
- All tags such as tables, lists, and headings must be valid.

If any of the items fail the Adobe Accessibility Checker, they must be fixed before the document is accessible.
